PHILOSOPHY OF CARE PICU

Our philosophy is based on family centered care, where we recognise, respect and support the essential role of the family in the lives of children.

We provide a caring environment for critically ill children in partnership with their families and encourage open communication.

We respect each child that we care for and treat them as individuals. We strive to provide compassionate, holistic care for each child whilst respecting cultural diversity and religious beliefs.

We are committed to promoting restoration of health to achieve the child's optimum level of health, however where death is inevitable we recognise that the child has the right to die with dignity and free from pain in the presence of those that love them.

Introduction:

Welcome to PICU. We hope that you enjoy your clinical placement in our units. This booklet aims to give you an overview of the units, the staff and the learning opportunities which are available to you during your placement.

Our Paediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU) is a 23 bedded unit split over two floors. PICU 1 comprises of 15 beds and PICU 2 holds 8 beds. We care for children from birth up to 16

years of age from all specialities including but not limited to cardiac, cardio thoracic, ENT, general surgery, medical, oncology, haematology and renal. The unit accepts over 1000 admissions per year and is one of the largest PICU's in Europe.

The PICU Team:

There are over 160 nurses in our PICU including nurse managers, a clinical education team, and research and audit nurses. Other members of the team include consultant intensivists, medical and anaesthetic doctors, specialist physiotherapists, dieticians, pharmacist, health care assistants, data managers, social workers, clerical staff, chaplaincy and household staff.

Learning Objectives:

During your stay with us we would like you to consider the following

- The normal anatomy of an infant and child
- The normal physiology of respiration
- Foetal circulation
- Basic Life Support
- Airway management equipment
- The management of chest drains and fluid balances

During this placement, take the opportunity to develop your basic patient assessment skills. This is a skill that will stay with you throughout your career.

Patient Safety:

The children in PICU require highly specialised nursing care. Although you are supernumerary it is important to involve yourself in the care of the patient and family in our care. Please be mindful to work within your own scope of practice and clarify what you can and cannot do with your preceptor.

PICU Routine:

Each day within the PICU environment can be very different and is dependent on the child's condition. Below is a rough guide of our daily routine.

- 7:30 Handover from night staff
- 8:00 Patient assessment and patient specific Daily Plan

8:15 Bloods

8:30 Organising TPN, CXR, U/S's

Onwards: Follow up on Team reviews and orders

Medications & Infusions Cares (Family Centred where applicable) Repositioning Parents visiting & updates Quiet time Examinations Follow up on examinations or ward rounds Consulting with Nurse Manager and MDT Documentation Dietary needs Observations And continuous reassessment from earlier baseline...

Student Support:

The PICU aims to provide a quality learning environment to everyone. A wide variety of learning resources and supports are available. You will be allocated a preceptor for your clinical placement. Nursing students have an opportunities to work with all staff nurses and the Clinical Nurse Facilitators. You will receive an orientation on your first day and the unit routine will be explained. If you experience any problems during your placement please ask any of our nursing team who will endeavour to offer support and a solution to your issue.

The PICU learning outcomes are available from your preceptor. There are several education folders on the unit that will also provide information about the children we care for. If you have any specific learning needs, please discuss these with your preceptor or member of the CNF team.

Undergraduate nursing students will complete a case-study on a child you have cared for and this will be presented at your reflective practice session. Finally, please enjoy your placement with us and be assured that we are all available to help and support you throughout your placement.

Hours of Placement (All Students)

You will be advised on how many days & weeks you must attend placement for (clinical shifts and reflective practice days) by the following:

- Supernumerary & Rostered Nursing students: Student Allocations Liaison Officer (SALO)
- PRCNS students: PRCNS Co-Ordinator

Off Duty

- Your off duty will be decided by the Clinical Nurse Manager 2.
- Changes to your off duty may be facilitated but this is dependent on ward skill mix.
- Duty may be swapped between students only with prior agreement of Clinical Nurse Manager 2.
- During your placement you will be allocated a preceptor and a co-preceptor. We try as much as possible to facilitate students to work alongside your allocated preceptor so that your assessments are performed by nursing staff you have been closely linked with.
- <u>Reflective practice</u>: You will be facilitated to attend your mandatory reflective practice sessions in the CCNE (Children's Centre for Nurse Education) or online. Reading & unstructured reflective practice will be accommodated but must be undertaken within the department.
